New Beginnings Resale Shoppe Celebrates Five Years of Impact and Hope

Helping Others, One Donation at a Time

Nine-vear-old Sara's smile stretched wide with wonder as her fingers traced the shiny sequins on a little purple purse. A sparkling rhinestone clasp caught the light, and inside, she discovered a handful of bracelets and a tiny ring shaped like a heart. Her eyes danced with delight.

Ms. Nan, the kind lady at the shop, had helped her find the purse - just right for a little girl who had been through so much. While Sara explored her new treasure, her mom quietly searched the racks for work clothes. Sara couldn't remember the last time they'd gone shopping together.

For the past year, they'd been running - moving from place to place to escape Sara's stepdad, who always seemed to find them. But this time was different. Her mom made the brave decision to

leave everything behind and move across the country. A high school friend, Ms. Katlyn, offered them a spare bedroom and a fresh start.

Within days of arriving, Ms. Katlyn brought them to Mission Granbury, where they met Ms. Nadine - a warm-hearted woman with a gentle voice who talked to Sara's mom about job opportunities and ways to get back on their feet. Before they left, she handed them a gift card for New Beginnings Resale Shoppe.

Now, as Sara waited just outside the dressing room, purse in hand and bracelets jingling softly on her wrist, she watched the curtain part and saw her mom step out in a new outfit, like she used to before this all started.

And for the first time in a long time, Sara didn't feel afraid. She felt safe.

This month marks a joyful milestone for one of Mission Granbury's most beloved and vital programs: New Beginnings Resale Shoppe is celebrating its fifth anniversary as a stand-alone store. More than just a resale shop, New Beginnings is a cornerstone of Mission Granbury's work, directly supporting the agency's mission of moving individuals and families from crisis to self-sufficiency.

Mission Granbury Breaks Ground on the Marilyn Luton Annex



When Marilyn Luton joined the Mission Granbury Board of Directors in 2016, she had no idea how deeply it would change her - or how much she would change Mission

Granbury. Though she brought years of board experience with several other organizations, she quickly discovered this board was different. Here, serving as the community's "hub for help" wasn't just a motto - it was a shared passion. At Mission Granbury, staff, volunteers, and board members weren't there just for a paycheck, to fill time or boost résumés; they were united by a mission to make a meaningful difference.

In 2019, Marilyn stepped up as President of the Board, only to face the unprecedented challenges of the COVID-19 pandemic. Alongside the Executive Director, staff, volunteers, fellow board members, and other community partners, she worked tirelessly to support Hood County families through the crisis.

Today, as Hood County grows and needs continue to rise, Mission Granbury is planning to meet those needs by building a 50' x 80' Annex to store vital disaster supplies and shelter agency vehicles. Earlier this year, the Board voted to name it the Marilyn Luton Annex, honoring

Marilyn's unwavering dedication and her heart for "moving adults and children from crisis to self-sufficiency."

Groundbreaking for the Marilyn Luton Annex is set for mid-July, with completion expected by early fall - a lasting tribute to a woman whose commitment has made our community stronger.

Granbury home since April 2001, after he persuaded Pfizer Animal Health that he could better serve their customers from the DFW area rather than New York City. Although he retired in 2004 at age 57, he continues to draw on the leadership skills he honed at Pfizer to serve Mission Granbury today.

Monty will tell you the most important lesson he's learned from serving Mission Granbury isn't about business, it's about humility. "No single person is more important than the whole of Mission Granbury and our mission," Monty says. "I am humbled daily by the dedication of our staff, volunteers, and donors who give so selflessly to help others."

Over the next five years, Monty envisions Mission Granbury continuing to "grow and adapt to the needs of our glorious community," guided by three priorities:

- Updating and following the Strategic Plan,
- Recruiting passionate staff, volunteers, and board members, and
- Ensuring donor support directly impacts Hood County families.

Since joining the Board in 2017, Monty has served as Secretary, Vice President, and

now President. He is especially proud of the milestones the team has achieved together: expanding the Resale Shoppe into a new building, upgrading the Resource Center and Ada Carey Shelter, renovating



the food pantry, enhancing CASA and Emergency Assistance programs, and advancing the new annex building for disaster relief and future growth.

Through it all, Monty hopes he is seen as a positive, humble leader and listener, a decision-maker, a peacemaker, and above all, a champion for Mission Granbury and the people it serves.

"I am hopeful that the team sees me as someone who is fully committed to lifting up this mission," he says, "because I am truly honored to serve alongside them."

Monty and Claudette recently celebrated their 50th wedding anniversary and have built a strong family legacy with three children, five grandchildren, and one great-grandchild.

His deep love for family and this community fuels his vision for Mission Granbury's future. □

New Beginnings Resale Shoppe plays a powerful role in funding Mission Granbury's nine critical programs, which serve over 15,000 individuals annually; from domestic violence support and emergency shelter to food assistance, senior and veteran services, CASA advocacy, and more. The Shoppe's proceeds help keep these programs running strong - and its impact extends far beyond financial support.

New Beginnings is also a resource for survivors of domestic violence and others in need, offering gift cards that allow individuals to shop with dignity. Survivors can pick out what they need in a safe, welcoming environment - often the first step in rebuilding a life of independence and healing. This simple, yet powerful approach ensures that every person is treated with the respect and autonomy they deserve.

The journey to New Beginnings' current location came with unexpected twists. In 2019, the Executive Director and Board of Directors began plans to build a new resale shoppe on a vacant lot next to the Resource Center. But in 2020, the COVID-19 pandemic disrupted everything.

Amid the uncertainty, then-Board Treasurer Jerry Prather noticed a building for sale on Waters Edge Drive. With better location and visibility, the Board decided purchasing the property would be more cost-effective than building new. It was a bold move - especially during a pandemic but one that proved to be the right call.

Since opening, New Beginnings has become a local favorite and a critical resource, distributing tens of thousands of dollars in clothing and household goods to families in crisis. Every item in the Shoppe is donated by the community, and every sale helps Mission Granbury continue its mission of serving those in need.

As New Beginnings Resale Shoppe celebrates five years in its current home, it's also celebrating five years of community generosity, volunteer dedication, and life-changing support. Every item donated, every dollar spent, and every hour volunteered has a community impact.

So, Happy Anniversary to New Beginnings Resale Shoppe - and heartfelt thanks to everyone who shops, donates, and supports this vital mission. Together, we truly are making a difference.

"She's the kind of person everyone wants to work with," says Scovel. "She brings fun to the task, but she's just as committed to getting the job done right. I knew she was the perfect fit within minutes of meeting her."

Looking ahead, Cheshe is already stirring up excitement for 2025, with a new twist on the always-popular Trivia Night this July (yes, costumes will definitely be involved!) and an exciting fall event in the works. Stay tuned - you won't want to miss what she's planning next!

THE NUMBERS

How You've Helped

Food Pantry/Emergency Assistance

- Our Food Pantry placed 29,782 units of food into the hands of our neighbors through weekly distributions, emergency bags, and senior deliveries - bringing hope and nourishment to an average of 400 households every week.
- Our Emergency Assistance Network, Mission Granbury's largest and fastest-growing program, is based at the Resource Center. In June alone, staff answered 1,608 calls for help. By June 30, case managers had assisted 7,518 individuals including veterans, seniors, and at least 200 unhoused neighbors with vital needs such as rent, utilities, medication, car repair, emergency shelter, food, and clothing.

Ada Carey Domestic Violence/ Sexual Assault Program

• The Ada Carey Shelter for Women and Children provided a safe haven for an average of 13 survivors each night - nearly half of them children. Our case managers and advocates answered 631 hotline calls and walked alongside an average of 20 victims each month through non-residential support. Altogether, they delivered 10,629 critical services - from shelter and crisis intervention to safety planning, food, and clothing - bringing hope and healing to more than 200 survivors of domestic violence and sexual assault.



CASA

 Our CASA (Court Appointed Special Advocates) stood by 92 foster children in the court system, including 21 who were new to care this year, ensuring each child had a voice and an advocate on their journey.
